- What does it mean to "idolise" purpose? If you're being honest with yourself, can
 you think of a time when you've done this, and if so, what was the fruit of that way of
 thinking in your life?
- Jake talks about how we often celebrate certain types of success and assume
 that that's what it looks like to live in purpose. How would you distinguish between
 success by the world's standards and a biblical definition of success? When we look
 at followers of God in Scripture, does godly success always lead to wealth and other
 people's applause?
- Is it possible for us to live God's purpose for our lives and not appear to be successful?
 Why or why not?
- Sharon asks, "Why do some people lead lives that lead to wealth and "success" and
 others have purpose that lead to lives of "ordinariness"?" What other words do you
 associate with the idea of ordinariness? Does the Bible promote or discourage the
 idea of being ordinary?
- It can be difficult to watch other people be "successful" while we're doing something that doesn't feel as celebrated. How can we guard our hearts from comparison, bitterness or jealousy and continue to live with peace and contentment?
